Sermon questions

Mark 15:1-20

1. Read **Isaiah 52:13-53:11**. How do you see these verses reflected in **Mark 15:1-20**?

2. Read **Mark 15:1-5**. Why do you suppose Jesus made no defense before Pilate?

3. Read **Mark 15:9-14**. How many times, essentially, did Pilate indicate he thought Jesus was innocent and that He should go free?

Read **John 18:38-39**. Do you think Pilate knew the right thing to do regarding Jesus? Have you ever been in a position where you knew what the right choice was, but still made the wrong choice? Explain.

4. Read **Mark 15:16-20**. Describe how the similarity of the soldiers' treatment of Jesus compares with how contemporary society tends to treat Jesus today. Describe how Jesus responded to the soldiers. What can you learn about God from these observations?

5. Read **Mark 11:7-11**. What was the attitude and the expectation of the Jewish people for Jesus in these verses?

Read **Mark 15:12-14**. What do you think happened to the Jews in the few days between these events?

Have the opinions of others or events in life ever caused you to doubt Jesus or change your beliefs about Him? Or, have you ever been angry or disappointed in your views or perceptions of what Jesus has or has not done for you? Explain.

6. Having studied this passage and heard Pastor Brad's sermon, what makes it worth it for you to follow Jesus today?

7. If you haven't already, at some point in following Jesus you will experience injustice. We all do. Three principles for how to handle injustice can be drawn from this passage: 1) let go of any expectation of justice; 2) stop trying to be heard; and 3) seek comfort in Christ. Do you think you can use these principles as a follower of Christ in your daily life? How specifically?

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
