2.	Read Mark 1:7-8 , 25-28 , and 2:8-12 . What's the dilemma the Jewish leaders faced in trying to answer Jesus' question in Mark 11:29-30 ?
3.	Why do you suppose Jesus didn't directly answer the question of the Jewish leaders?
4.	These verses are unquestionably about Jesus' authority. Remember that so far in Mark Jesus has exercised His authority over nature, sickness, evil, even over death. When or why is it easy for you to submit to His authority?
	When or why do you struggle with or disobey His authority?
